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





Treasurer's Report



Dear members.

The office of the Treasurer, Alliance High School Old Boys Club, is pleased to present its report in respect of the financial year 2021. We would like to bring to your attention the following in relation to the year 2021 accounts and activities:

- Our accounts have been audited, and the auditors returned an unqualified opinion. We are proud of the club's capacity to keep financial records and accounts that meet 'best practice' standards.
 Kudos to all involved.
- We turned an operating deficit of KShs 266,028 (compared to a surplus of KShs 374,674 for the year 2020).
- As a result, our members' equity position declined to KShs 799,248 as at 31 December 2021, from KShs 1,124,616 as at 31 December 2020.

- You may recall comments made in the Treasurer's report last year on the then constrained fundraising environment (Covid-19 induced) that made it impossible for your club to hold the customary annual golf tournament in 2021. This situation meant that we started the year 2021 with barely enough funds to keep the office open and even then, operating on a bare bones basis and hence we did not have funds for our usual programs in 2021. We therefore unfortunately, had to reduce even further in 2021, our activities as a club compared to the already dire situation in 2020. The sole substantial activity for the year was a successful fundraiser to support the medical expenses needs of our fellow alumnus and former headmaster at AHS, Mr. Miricho Wagitu.
- We are however grateful for the support that members and other old boys gave when called upon, such as in Mr.
 Wagitu's case mentioned above, as well as when a call was made in 2021 for membership registrations (life and annual).

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2022 AHS Legacy Centre Status Report



Since its inception in 2019, as conceptualized in the AHS OBC Masterplan, the AHS Legacy Centre Team has relentlessly continued its onward march toward realisation of the final product – A Digital Archive of AHS. A technical report documenting the various project phases beginning with initial benchmarking with international schools, was submitted last year to AHS OBC for further action. In addition to the Digital Archive of AHS, the technical report recommended a custom-built physical facility for archiving information materials and physical artifacts that embody the rich history of Alliance High School since its founding in 1926, and as it approaches its centennial celebrations in 2026. Four working visits by the AHS Legacy Centre Team have so far been made to the school – the first two (2020 and 2021) involved the immediate former Chief Principal (Mr. William Mwangi), coupled with an overview of the School Archives and Library Services.

The latter two visits involved the School Librarian (Ms. Rosalind Kinya) who is currently co-opted into the AHS Legacy Centre Team together with her assistants as our contact persons on the ground. They are already capturing data on seven (7) major categories of information materials and physical artifacts that will form a critical component of the AHS Digital Archive. More fascinating work lies ahead, and the team is fortunately, up to the task. Mr. David Chomba, the current Chief Principal is eager to support the project and we look forward to working with him going forward. We invite all old boys interested in dedicating their resources toward the project's success.

Finally, I thank the AHS Legacy Team members for their professional contributions, despite their busy schedules and geographical dispersion.

The History of Alliance High School



This project aims to continue J. Smith's book of the same name, carrying on from 1965 to the present. This coincides within Kenya's independent era, a watershed in the country's educational institutions marked by great development and myriad challenges. As the School prepares for its centenary celebrations, the new book will hopefully serve as our Rosetta stone, helping us interpret and decipher this eventful period.

The committee tasked with this project has met a few times and drafted a book concept. The concept borrows heaving from the previous book in that it comprises an eye witness account of events at the school. A comprehensive list of topics covering academics, school resources, social life and administration has been identified. While the main book is to be written from a school administration's point of view, the new iteration proposes a substantial section with students' perspective. The concept incorporates research methods for data collection, editorial standards and physical specifications of the book.

This is important as it ensures any new committee member has a ready reference and that the current committee is aligned when planning the book. The committee has agreed to commence with a pilot covering Mr Mwangi's tenure.

So far Mr Mwangi himself has been interviewed, as has the past OBC chair Mr Nduranu as well as a group of students. Several hours of interviews are currently being transcribed. The pilot will not only demonstrate the concept but also enhance the tools and processes for the entire book, including a basis for budgeting.

So, while much of the foundation has been set, a great deal of work lies ahead. The committee continues to look forward to the cooperation of the administrative and student community and particularly thanks the OBC for facilitating the interviews. The committee will continue to lean heavily on this support.

Meet the 'boys'

Meet Shem Yator, (5144, Class of '90), Erastus Ngatia (5622, Class of '92) and Kenneth Muchina (5976, Class of '94), a trio of old boys with an interesting 'problem'.

What is this trio all about?

Challenging self, having fun while at it, travelling and seeing the world, experiencing different places, and exploring and living new experiences... and very importantly, sharing all this with valued friends... This is what we fancy describes the parts of our lives that we share.

Shem and Erastus shared the years 1989 and 1990 at the the school we love the most, while Erastus and Kenneth shared the years 1991 and 1992. We like to think that the foundation of the friendship we have today traces its roots to those periods at the Alliance High School.

About 8 or so years ago, the relationships above converged and the current phase of our friendship started: on running trails and around Kenya with one of the preeminent recreation running clubs in Kenya, Urban Swaras Running Club.

We today are not certain what got us to sign up for recreational running, but it is safe to suggest that middle age related 'issues' were at play!

We are in all ways, 'everyday people', in the sense that we are all family men, each doing his bit to raise our respective families. That suggests that to pay bills, we are engaged in legitimate 'typical' income generating activities: Shem is a public health specialist working with a multilateral organisation. Erastus is an architect in private practice, and Kenneth is a Corporate Finance advisor in private practice.

When the heavy duties of raising families and raising money to pay taxes are not weighing heavily on us, or more accurately, to 'balance' our lives, we look to the great big outdoors for 'stuff to do', severally and together: we run (road and trail), we hike trails, we camp outdoors, we climb mountains, etc.

Our experiences together 'build' us and give us opportunity to give back to the society We do the fun things that we do together first to meet our respective personal objectives. It is to our mutual benefit that some of these personal objectives are shared. We have learnt that in sharing in these, we can meet friends (ourselves and others), share time and in some instances, bond beyond the shared activity (running etc). We have found that these bonding sessions give rise to opportunity for growth to the individual.

Insh'allah (as Ngatia is wont to say), we intend to keep expanding our horizons and experiences in the coming years. As soon as the spring sunning season (April – May) of 2023.

We are on the lookout for marathon races that we can take part in over the coming years, in different countries and continents around the world.

We would not terribly mind receiving suggestions and invitations from old boys to events that they like and/or would want to take part in alongside us.

And yes, we will be happy to grow our little band by having other old boys around the world join us. There is truth in the sayings: 'the more the merrier' and 'many hands make lighter a task'. Getting to some of the destinations we dream of and taking part in the events in those places becomes easier and more fun if we are more!

ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below:

1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with and comply with International Financial Reporting Standards.

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention.

2 Financial instruments

Financial instruments carried on the statement of the financial position include cash balances, receivables and payables. The particular recognition methods adopted are disclosed in the individual policy statements associated with each item.

3 Revenue recognition

Income is realised from members' contribution and fund raising activities as well as fees charged for specific events.

4 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the club has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation can be made.

5 Cash and cash equivalents

For the purposes of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand and with banks.

6 Equipment

The cost of an item of equipment is recognised as an asset when:

- a) It is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the company.
- b) Cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Equipment is initially measured at cost. Costs include costs incurred initially to acquire or construct an item of equipment and costs incurred subsequently to add to, replace part of, or service it. If a replacement cost is recognised in the carrying amount of an item of equipment, the carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised.

Equipment is depreciated on the reducing balance method over their expected useful lives to their estimated residual value.

The depreciation chart of items of equipment has been assessed as follows:

The residual value, useful life and depreciation method of each asset are reviewed at the end of each reporting period. If the expectations differ from previous estimates, the change is accounted for as a change in accounting estimate.
